Through this work we have been able to launch our Leadership and Development Awards which identifies and supports emerging leaders in endocrinology. Much of our work looking at how to attract and retain scientist members is also now culminating in new programmes and awards ensuring the Society is meeting the changing needs of researchers. Also this year we were delighted to be able to introduce funding to support endocrine nurses to undertake masters-level training.

Recruiting the next generation & supporting CAREER DEVELOPMENT AT ALL STAGES

Our Society holds events and provides grants, prizes and awards to **support the training and professional development of our members** at all career stages, as well as celebrating excellence and sharing best practice. We also provide opportunities for younger people that help engage them with hormones and aim to inspire them to follow endocrinology as their career.

Our Science Committee supports Society initiatives to attract and retain scientists in endocrinology and help facilitate members to further their careers.

INSPIRING THE NEXT GENERATION OF ENDOCRINOLOGISTS

In 2019, our Society **funded 12 Summer Studentships** to provide hands-on experience in a research environment. We also held the third **National Endocrinology and Diabetes Taster Day** with Young Diabetologists and Endocrinologists' Forum to encourage trainees to choose endocrinology.

The **SfE BES schools outreach event** was organised to inspire local school children to follow endocrinology as a career. It attracted 70 key stage 4 students from five schools and included an introduction to endocrinology, careers 'speed dating',

hands-on activities and a Q&A session.



A highlight for us in 2019 was the launch of our **Leadership and Development Awards Programme** to recognise emerging talent and provide opportunities for career progression for 12 outstanding members

Engaging with the media to promote accurate science

We put journalists in contact with our expert Media Ambassadors to ensure important scientific research can be shared accurately and responsibly, informing the wider public about the importance of endocrinology to their health.

Society Media Ambassadors continued to help promote accurate reporting of science in the media in 2019 by tackling misinformed stories in two high-profile publications. Concerns were raised amongst our experts about potentially misleading articles in The Times and the Guardian and, as a result of their intervention, both were retracted or edited.

DISSEMINATING INFORMATION ON HORMONES TO THE PUBLIC

Our public-facing website, You and Your Hormones, is a source of accurate information about hormones for students, teachers and the public, and aims to help people make better informed health decisions.

Published joint Position Statements on safe treatment of hyperprolactinaemia and against recent treatment recommendations for subclinical hypothyroidism

Recommended 2 years' minimum protected specialty training time for Endocrinology and Diabetes, which has been acknowledged by the GMC

Established a new working group looking at genetics in endocrinology that aims to develop a series of short guidance documents, to ensure easy access to information and education

RECOGNISING EXCELLENCE

Society Medal winners are world leaders in endocrinology, whose work continues to advance our knowledge and clinical practice. Each of our 2019 medallists presented their plenary lectures at the Society for Endocrinology BES conference 2019 on 11-13 November in Brighton.



SHARING **BEST PRACTICE**

Our Interdepartmental Peer Review scheme aims to improve

services for endocrine patients and support clinical endocrinologists, by providing an external assessment of clinical governance and service delivery. The visit facilitates an exchange of ideas and experiences, and allows areas of concern to be voiced. It aims to share best practice to improve service delivery.

FEEDBACK FROM CONSULTANTS

An excellent opportunity to reflect within the team and related departments on the quality of endocrine service provision. This facilitates discussion about gaps and potential improvements. A welcome opportunity to benchmark our endocrine services with centres of similar size.'

In 2019, Society journals received strong impact factors and continued to provide an important home for the best scientific and clinical research in endocrinology.



SFE BES 2019

The Society's annual SfE BES conference took place in Brighton on 11-13 November and attracted 1,155 attendees, over 3 days, for the very best clinical and scientific endocrine research. The programme for 2019 was refocussed around our Endocrine Network communities, with new

innovation and skills sessions, to help support our members' career development.

CONNECTING THE ENDOCRINE COMMUNITY

Our work with patient support groups brings patients together with the rest of the endocrine community to share experiences and expertise. In 2019, the Society provided funds to 7 different endocrine patient groups to attend Society events, where they had the opportunity to network with endocrinologists and share good practice standards for endocrine care and service provision.

The link between the Patient Support Groups and the Society for Endocrinology enables a flow of information in both directions, enabling collaborative and co-ordinated approaches to the provision of both care and information."
